OBSERVATIONS:

The survey reveals that all students have been able to comprehend that social reality can be understood from different perspectives and that they are able to identify the central arguments of the different perspectives that were taught. Only a very small fraction of the total is not able to clearly analyse the distinctness of perspectives.

OBSERVATIONS:

The survey reveals that the majority of class was satisfied with the course. More than 90 percent of students felt that the course had provided them with systematic understanding of structured inequalities and explained to them the key axes of stratification. Above 85 percent students felt that the course had familiarised them with the key concepts, principal theories and critical debates on stratification. They also felt that the course had enabled them to understand the process of social mobility and its reproduction. Around 82.4 percent of students felt that the course allowed them to translate their understanding of inequality and think of research options and possibilities.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:

In future more practical training will be emphasised so that students are able to link up theory and concepts on stratification with everyday instances of inequalities and pursue research on it. Students will also be further encouraged to have classroom discussions and debates on various aspects related to the course and formulate topics for research work.

In the future, more hands-on activities and interactive teaching methods will be incorporated to improve learning.



Based on the observations greater effort will be made to balance the theoretical and the empirical in the classroom discussions and debates.


More practical work will also be assigned to the students and students will be encouraged to improve their attendance so that the surveys they respond to are more true.

Since most of the feedback was positive, the same pedagogies will be continued. More interactive and field-based activities will be conducted in the future.



ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:



ACTION TO BE TAKEN REPORT:



The student feedback on the course outcomes was positive. More outdoor learning and field based activities would be conducted.


