



National Handloom Day

Echoes of Tradition 'A Tribal Celebration'





of their outreach activity. The team, consisting of Rhythm, Sanjitha, Arunima, and Swati, aimed to offer emotional support and spread joy among young cancer patients through play and companionship.

The group was warmly received by the hospital staff, whose cooperation and kindness helped create a welcoming atmosphere.

The ward's peaceful and nurturing environment set the tone for a positive and engaging session with the children.

The visit was filled with interactive activities that encouraged participation and laughter. Games such as Headbanz, Jenga, and Guess Who became the highlight of the session, allowing the children to immerse themselves in play and momentarily forget the challenges of treatment. Some joined in enthusiastically right from the start, while others were initially reserved but gradually opened up through encouragement and care.

Conversations about hobbies, school life, and everyday interests created an additional layer of connection. The combination of playful games and light-hearted dialogue built trust, brought smiles, and brightened the atmosphere in the ward. By the end of the visit, what began as an outreach activity turned into a deeply meaningful experience of warmth, empathy, and shared joy. The interaction not only uplifted the children but also left a lasting impression on the visiting team, reminding them of the profound impact that small acts of companionship and kindness can have.

On 25th August 2025, three students - Nikita, Nisha, and Shambhavi - visited the hospital and spent an hour interacting with and playing games with the

children. Activities included playing Jenga (Trembling Tower), colouring mandala art, and making paper stars.

During the visit, the students had memorable interactions with two children - Dhanvi and Ram Krishna. Dhanvi enjoyed colouring the mandala sheets, while Ram Krishna enthusiastically played Jenga, laughing as the tower fell. The joyful expressions on the children's faces reflected the success of the initiative in bringing them moments of happiness amidst their treatment.

Reflections:

Nikita: "Meeting Dhanvi and Ram Krishna was heartwarming. Dhanvi's interest in mandala colouring and Ram Krishna's excitement in stacking Jenga blocks made me smile. Their happiness was contagious, and I felt glad to be a part of Project Sathi."



On 7th sep, 2025, as third-year students of sociology, we visited the Oncology Ward at Ganga Ram Hospital, Karol Bagh. The purpose of our visit was not just to observe but to share a little time, warmth, and affection with the young patients and their families. What we experienced during that one hour is something far deeper than what can be put into

words—it was a reminder of resilience, innocence, and the healing power of human connection.

The hospital atmosphere was calm and organized, and the staff members guided us kindly, which gave us confidence. But the true essence of the visit began the moment we entered the ward. We had imagined a space filled with silence and sadness, yet what welcomed us was something completely different. The children, despite their fragile health, were full of life. Their sparkling eyes, curious smiles, and playful gestures filled the ward with an energy we did not expect.

Some children were shy at first, clinging to their parents, but soon they opened up with surprising warmth. Their eagerness to talk, to play small games, and to laugh with us made the atmosphere lighter. Two very small babies touched us the most—once they were in our arms, they didn't want to go back to their mothers. They held on tightly, as if finding comfort in our presence. That innocent trust was both heartwarming and overwhelming. It made us realize how much children crave love, not just from their families but from anyone willing to offer it.

What struck us most was how active and enthusiastic the children were. They participated in every little interaction with so much energy that it was hard to believe they were battling serious illnesses. Their laughter echoed in the ward, softening even the tired expressions of their parents. For a moment, it felt as though sickness had been pushed aside, replaced by joy and liveliness.

At first, we were nervous about approaching them, but slowly, all hesitation disappeared. Their response gave us courage, and what began as small attempts

at conversation turned into genuine bonds. We found ourselves laughing, playing, and talking as though we had known them for a long time. Watching their parents smile quietly as they saw their children happy, even for a short while, was one of the most touching parts of the experience.

By the end of the visit, our hearts were heavy but full. We realized that compassion doesn't require big actions; sometimes, it is simply about being present and offering a little love and kindness. This visit taught us gratitude—for our health, for our opportunities, and for the lives we often take for granted. More importantly, it showed us that even in spaces of pain, life, joy, and hope can still flourish.






Pedagogy Workshop on Sociology of Food

On 29th September, 2025, the students from the Sociology department of JDMC were provided the opportunity to volunteer in the Oncology Department of Shri Ganga Ram Hospital, Karol Bagh, Delhi from 11:30 AM to 12:30PM.

While entering the hospital, the discussion took place of what we were supposed to do. The premises was neutral and sanitised by the staff. After entering, we were guided towards an area designed for sitting where some children were already sitting while the others were being called out to come and participate. We could see that for some, the whole scene was new but the others, it's been some time that they have visited the Hospital.

It was disturbing yet an eye opening experience of the common world, these children and we, shared. Some children had a cannula in their small hands while the others had a small patch used for taking blood, a contrasting difference which made no difference in our behaviour yet could be life changing for them.

The beginning was quite awkward with us and children, both being so out of tune with each other but with small encouragement and coaxing from parents and staff, we found our footing with the children. It took some time and a lot of colour before we could talk, discuss and laugh over what drawing should've been and what that we made.

As refreshing as this experience was for all of us, so was it heartwrenching to see such children full of life, love and laughter being drained like this by cancer.

From the anxious glances of parents and relatives alike to children not having energy to even play. It was hard to experience for us, and it made me question how disturbing it would be for a parents to experience such, to see the light dimming in their children. And yet they were resilient to fight for their future, to see hope in such times, to have a smile on their faces.


•Adya Tripathi (3rd Year)

A Stain That Speaks

Ram inherited a shirt from his father. At first glance, it looked ordinary, except for a deep blue stain that refused to fade away. He thought it was just a mark from his father's work at the textile dyeing factory. Surely, after a few washes, it would disappear. But no matter how many times he tried, the stain remained—strong, unyielding, and almost alive with its own story.

One day, puzzled, Ram asked his father about it. His father looked at the stain with heavy eyes and replied with words that struck Ram deeply: "Some stains never wash away, because they are not marks of color, but of history." After hearing this, Ram stood silent, unable to utter a word.

That stain was not just a stain. It carried the weight of suffering, of struggle, and of voices that once cried out for justice. His father explained that it was indigo dye, a reminder of the dark days of British colonial rule in India. During that time, peasants were forced to grow indigo under the *tinkatha* system, where three out of every twenty kathas of land had to be used for indigo cultivation.

The profits went to the British, but the losses crushed the peasants. Their staple crops disappeared, the soil turned infertile, and starvation spread across villages. Exploitation was so harsh that it pushed peasants to speak up for themselves. In 1859–60, this gave birth to the Indigo Rebellion, where thousands of farmers in Bengal rose in defiance, declaring: "Ame nil bijabo na"—"We will not plant indigo." Dinabandhu Mitra, through his play *Nil Darpan*, gave voice to this suffering and revealed the cruelty of colonial exploitation.

From a sociological perspective, the indigo struggle reflects how structures of power and economy shaped the everyday lives of the oppressed. The peasants' resistance was not just about agriculture, but about reclaiming dignity, livelihood, and autonomy. As Karl Marx once noted, "The history of all previous societies has been the history of class struggles." The rebellion showed that even the most marginalized can challenge injustice when exploitation crosses its threshold.

Ram looked at the stain once more. It was no longer just a mark on an old shirt—it was a memory, an epitome, and a reminder that "some stains remain, to remind us never to bow before oppression again."

Devi (1960)

Movie Review

Devi (1960), directed by Satyajit Ray, featuring Sharmila Tagore, Soumitra Chatterjee, and Chhabi Biswas as main leads, is a movie and social commentary which covers many social evils. The movie is set in Bengal in the 19th century and depicts how social customs and religious orthodoxy influence the life of ordinary men, especially of people coming from lower castes and women. There is a sharp contradiction between colonial modernity and traditional beliefs. Ray has beautifully shown tensions between modernity and tradition.

Set in 19th century rural Bengal, Devi tells the haunting story of Doyamoyee, a young bride living with her in-laws while her husband studies in Calcutta. One fine day, her deeply religious father-in-law dreams that Doyamoyee is the incarnation of goddess kali. Convinced of her divinity, he and later on, the whole village started worshiping her. Once, the grandson of a beggar who had a fever due to starvation was brought to her where the pandemic made him consume the milk which was used to clean her feet. Naturally, once the thirst and hunger were fulfilled, the child went back to life. Blinded by faith, all of them believed it was Doyamoyee's miracle. She is slowly consumed by the burden of being treated as a goddess. Her own fragile humanity and internalized patriarchy stopped her from going to Calcutta with her husband. There was also a clash between the ideologies of the father, a traditionalist brahmin who blindly follows religion, and his son with modern thoughts influenced by colonialism and liberation.

In Devi, Doyamoyee becomes a tragic victim of patriarchy and superstition. Her father-in-law's blind authority and dream-driven belief strip her choice, identity and, ultimately, her freedom and traps her in a divine role she never chose. Treated as a goddess and not human, it results in her suffering in isolation, emotional torment and, ultimately, devastating loss of the relationships she once adored.

Satyajit Ray brings the story alive through haunting black and white frames. Ravi Shankar's music deepens the unease while Ray's gentle yet heart-piercing vision reveals how blind faith and patriarchy can crush a young woman's spirit, making the tragedy painfully real.
