From 10 to 12 October 2025, Rhetorque, the English Debating Society of JDMC, hosted its online British Parliamentary Debate tournament, Bhaavarth. The event witnessed enthusiastic participation with 30 teams and 15 Adjudicators, both national and international, participating in the event.

The Core Adjudication Panel consisted of Mahesh R., Adhiraj Singh, Aniket Patra, and Snigdha Priyadarshini, whose carefully crafted motions sparked dynamic and thought-provoking debates throughout the tournament.

The first day saw four intense preliminary rounds, setting the stage for an exciting second day that featured the fifth round, the announcement of breaks, followed by the quarter-finals, semi-finals, and the grand finale.

Bhaavarth proved to be an enriching platform for students to engage with contemporary issues ranging from economics to education and cultural narratives. The participants showcased remarkable eloquence, logical reasoning, and presence of mind throughout the rounds.

The Closing Ceremony celebrated the achievements of outstanding participants and recognized excellence in debating and adjudication.

In the Adjudicator category, Arnav Garg was awarded the title of Best Judge for his remarkable contribution.

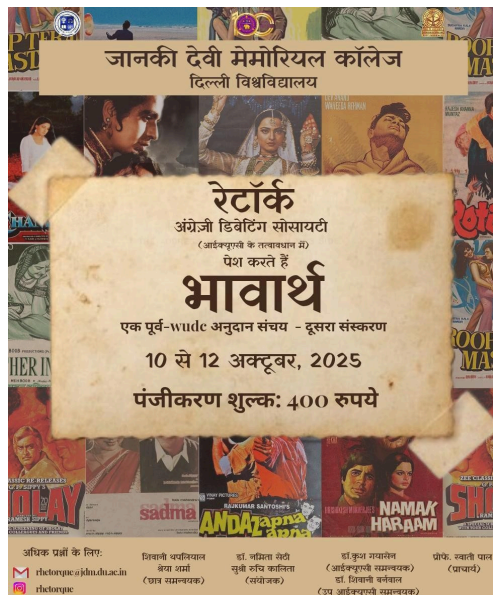

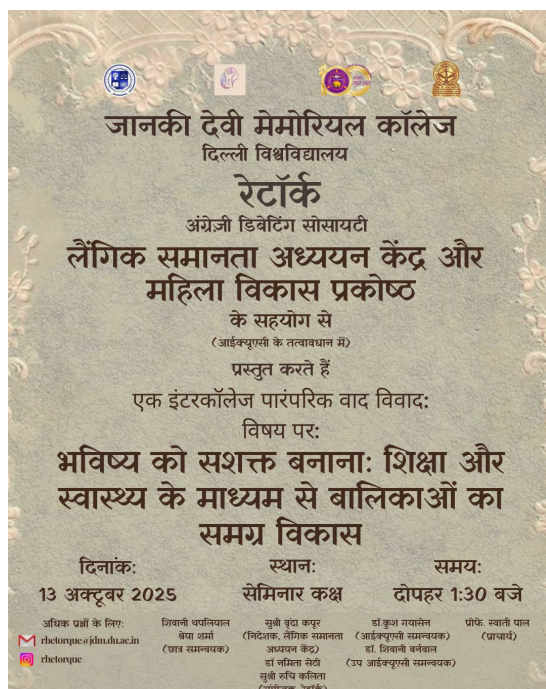
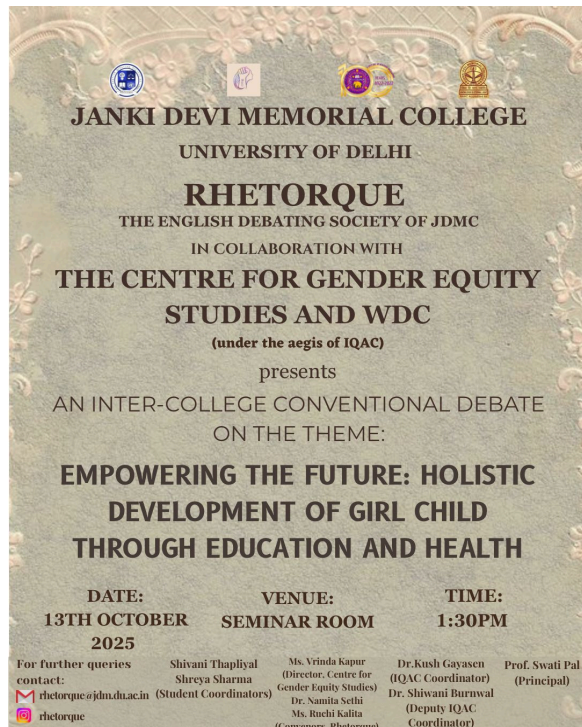

2nd Best Speaker: Akshita Jangwar (Prize: Rs.2,000)

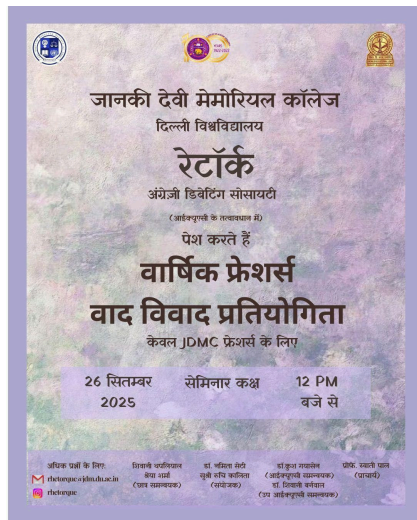
3rd Best Speaker: Jasmita Sarmah (Prize: Rs.1,500)

### **Exhibition Debate**

Rhetorque, the English Debating Society of JDMC, organized an Exhibition Debate on 22 September 2025 in the College Auditorium from 2 PM onwards. The event aimed to provide the first year student members of the society with a practical understanding of the Asian

Parliamentary Debate (APD) format, its structure, and techniques through a live demonstration by the union members of Rhetorque. The session witnessed enthusiastic participation from the members of the society, who engaged in rigorous argumentation and critical discussion, reflecting their growing command over debating conventions. The exhibition format allowed the audience, especially the new recruits, to observe and comprehend the dynamics of constructive speeches, rebuttals, and points of information that characterize the APD model. The panel of judges comprised Yashika Chandravanshi, Anushka Srivastav, and Tanu Shree Upadhyaya, all experienced and accomplished debaters, who brought their expertise and insight to the adjudication process. The motion for the debate centered around a thought-provoking theme examining the intersection of gender, intelligence, and feminism. Participants deliberated upon a context involving new research suggesting notable cognitive differences between men and women, exploring whether the disclosure of such findings would strengthen the feminist cause by challenging existing stereotypes or risk reinforcing biological determinism and gender-based polarization. Each team engaged critically with these nuances—analyzing the ethical, social, and strategic implications of such revelations. The debate encouraged participants to reflect on how feminism, equality, and scientific discourse intersect, fostering a balanced engagement of reason, empathy, and conviction throughout the session. The Government team comprised Shivani Thapliyal, Jyoti Kuhar, and Disha Singh, while the Opposition team consisted of Akshara Gargas, Shreya Sherma, and Kaashyapi Golani. Both teams presented compelling arguments and showcased exceptional oratory and analytical skills, making the session both thought-provoking and enriching.

After a series of engaging speeches and rebuttals, the judges deliberated and announced the Government team as the winner of the exhibition debate. Through this initiative, Rhetorque sought to cultivate a spirit of analytical thinking, teamwork, and articulate expression among its members. The debate not only served as a valuable learning experience but also reinforced the society's commitment to nurturing confident and informed debaters capable of addressing complex socio-political themes with clarity and conviction. The event concluded with an interactive session where the experienced debaters shared insights and tips with the new members, fostering an atmosphere of mentorship and collaboration. The exhibition debate proved to be both informative and inspiring, marking yet another successful endeavour by

Rhetorque in its pursuit of promoting critical dialogue, intellectual engagement, and excellence in debating.
